Attendance numbers were down this year with a total of 41 only, but it was a pleasure to welcome three of our Honorary members John Turner, George Turner and Robert Eggleston.

Entertainment included a quiz, poem from Val, an amusing letter of complaint from Sue, the Rotary 9 o'clock news read by Roger and Colin and our wonderful Christmas fairy Mark Thompson.

The members gave generously to a raffle which raised £155 for Rotary charities.

Jenny Taylor's life story

Jenny Taylor was born just after the Second World War in North Nottinghamshire.

Her parents were tenants on the Thoresby Estate, a sand land farm situated near Ollerton. In fact the sand occasionally drifted like snow through the hedges and across the road after spring drilling. Since her childhood more fields are drilled in the autumn reducing this problem

Jenny can just remember the last two working horses, the binder and thrashing days.

Her father was the first in the area to irrigate the land, improving the crop yields.

After leaving school at 16 she attended Brackenhurst, now De Montfort University.

During the year course she studied Home Economics, Book Keeping, Animal Husbandry, Poultry, and Horticulture. This was a most enjoyable year making lasting friendships.

Jenny then trained at Sheffield to work with mentally handicapped children, and when qualified was employed at a school in Mansfield.

On Michaelmas Day 1969 she moved to Fields Farm Sapcote new-

ly wed with her husband Martin. The farm was in a poor way giving the couple a challenge, but they embraced the opportunity to dairy farm.

The first year 30 British Friesian cows were milked in the cow shed, and the milk cooled into churns. A pole barn was built for the second winter, this made room to expand the herd, milking in a parlour, and the milk stored in a bulk tank ready for collection.

During the next 28 years the livestock numbers grew as did the buildings to house and



store fodder. With 130 milking cows and their followers, extra land was bought and also rented to provide grazing and silage.

In 1996, Martin and Jenny's three daughters had their own careers and the difficult decision was made to sell the herd of cows.

Martin then learnt how to grow cereals, and they also decided to diversify.

Plans were drawn for three small offices, and eventually after persevering with the planning and highway departments the offices were eventually built and let early 2000.

This was followed by two offices being extended, and another two new builds.

In 2008 Martin fell in a freak accident and died from his injuries, and since then the land has been contract farmed.

Fifteen months later daughter Suzy was diagnosed with cancer, and died leaving her son George (10 months) a grieving husband family and friends.

During Jenny's time at Sapcote she has been and still is an active member of the WI.

She has spent 20 plus years on the Sapcote Playing Fields Management Committee, and supported Copston Magna Church.
