Foundation Talk on Monday 2nd October

Our speaker on Monday was the District Rotary Foundation chair Paul Dickinson of the Melton Mowbray Belvoir Club who spoke on Foundation.

Based on 36 members our contribution last year was slightly less than the \$100 per member aim which placed the Club about mid way in the District.

In total \$330 million was donated in the year and such is the size the cost of running the Organisation was \$57 million.

Paul mentioned the financial benefit of applying for grants which boost money available to any project.

Grants are awarded when two clubs come together to raise money for a specific project and jointly apply for a grant. The Clubs can be in different countries. The club chair must first pass the Foundation exam which will take less than 30 minutes on line. The eradication of polio is still one of the main projects. There are very low numbers of polio now in just two countries which includes India. Rotary support since 1988 has eradicated 99.9% of polio cases and vaccination will continue for two years after nil infections are reported.

Proposed Lutterworth Youth Club

Last Monday, 9th October 2023, Sally Hollis and Val Cooper invited Mike English, Chairman of Lutterworth Athletic Football Club, to speak to us and below you will find a brief overview of the Club.

Lutterworth Athletic Club was established in 1983 to provide the children and youth of Lutterworth and surrounding villages with the opportunity of playing local League Football; at the same time learning both physical and emotional skills, team discipline and, of course, having lots of fun.

The Club has been accredited as an FA Charter Standard Club since the 1st July 2009. The Charter Standard provides recognition by the FA to clubs that are well run with sustainability at its heart and with child protection and safety paramount.

It also recognises a Club's commitment to coaching, player and coach development and raising the standards of behaviour in the game.

Recently the Club completed and passed its annual FA Health Check enabling it to operate as a FA Charter Standard Club for the 4th season in succession. They guarantee that the club is run properly and the welfare of the children is of the highest priority. As many of you are already aware the Club is undergoing a huge transitional period throughout this season, and they are about to realise the dream of accommodating all of the teams at a single facility in Hall Lane. This is something that they have been trying to achieve since the Club was formed nearly 30 years ago. When completed it will be without doubt one of the best sports facilities in the county which will not only enable them to generate a real identity but also create a sense of community at the Club.

In former seasons this has been a huge challenge as their nomadic existence has seriously inhibited progress in this area. They are now relying on their members to endorse their vision and move the Club forward.

Val and Sally are interested to find out if ,with Rotary's help, this Club could develop a youth club offering other activities outside sport to capture those children who are not interested in sport.

They will let you know how they get on over the coming months.

Lutterworth Fire Brigade Fire Safety in the home

Our Speaker at Rotary was Andy Smith who moved to Lutterworth from Market Harborough Fire Station where he had been Manager for the past 40 years. His subject was Fire Safety in the Home and what you should do to prevent a fire. He spoke about what needed to be regularly checked to avoid a fire like the devastating one that happened in Lutterworth at the Shambles in the Market Square on Monday 13th February. *See photo opposite.* Andy ran through things we should look out for in our homes – quoting the fact we are twice as likely to die in a fire if you don't have a smoke alarm that works.

90 people die each year in a house fire if the battery in the smoke alarm is flat or the battery is missing.

Have an alarm on each storey of the house and check them often.

If you have a gas appliance have a carbon monoxide alarm fitted in an appropriate place.

5 fires a day are started by using candles.

Faulty electrical wiring or an overloaded socket cause 7,000 house fires across the country each year.

If you use an electric blanket roll them when not in use

never fold them as this, over time, can create an electrical short circuit. Always unplug the blanket when it is not being used.

Shut doors at night to stop a potential fire spreading.

Christmas lights should be replaced after 3 years use.

Anyone without a smoke alarm can contact the local Fire Service and they can be fitted free and come with a 10 year battery life.

The Lutterworth Station carry out 600 fire safety checks each year and his helpful comments were a reminder to go home and do our own checking.
